Something Interesting:

According to Rittenhousevillages.com, regular visits to museums helps with brain stimulation by providing opportunities to "learn something new while exercising critical thinking skills." It goes on to say that museums help with social interaction, giving visitors new and interesting topics of conversation both during and after the visit. Visiting the local museum can even be part of treatment for dementia.

The statistics in the article intrigued me. "Researchers found that older adults who visited one exhibition at the museum a year faced a 14% lower risk of early death. Those who visited exhibitions on a regular basis benefited from a 31% lower risk of early mortality." Now, the old math teacher in me would note that there is a difference between correlation and causation, but there is a certain logic to their argument that visiting museums has positive health benefits! Fortunately, we have two museum's right here in Seaford! Be sure to visit us at least once a year...you might live longer!

Something (s) Important:

This has been a big year for infrastructure improvement at the Seaford Historical Society, especially at Ross Mansion. The Honeymoon Cottage and Slave Quarter received much-needed repairs; all of the outbuildings got fresh coats of paint, and most now have new metal roofing. While this was happening, we started the interior restoration and formal garden installation at the mansion. By the time we get to the New Year, we should be wrapping up this phase of the project and starting to plan a "Grand Re-Opening" in the spring. "If you've seen Ross Mansion, you haven't seen Ross Mansion."

We also completed the HVAC work at the Seaford Museum just in time for the Holiday Train Exhibit to open! More than just replacing what was there; the new system provides climate control in our basement storage rooms. Humidity control throughout the building will allow us better preserve our artifacts for generations to come!

Since 2021, we have made almost a half-million dollars' worth of improvements to our facilities, almost all of it overseen by our Vice-President, Bill Collison. For three years, he has been on-sight daily to attend meetings, solve problems, and lend a hand with multiple projects all at once. Others have provided significant help, including Chris Black and Dan Parsons, but these projects would not have happened without Bill's dedication.

We were able to get the Train display up and running in record time following the work in the ceiling. The Train Exhibit has now begun and is being well attended. Luckily, the Star newspaper has continued to give us free advertisement in their paper. They are charging most (as in almost all) clients for the ads that they are providing weekly to us due to our providing such a low cost Christmas happening for the community to enjoy. If you see someone from the paper, please thank them for their service. As well as the Guide. They are providing free advertisements for the train exhibit as well. AND WE NEED SEVERAL MORE VOLUNTEERS TO FILL IN FOR THE WEEKENDS AROUND THE HOLIDAYS. These are the dates where we need help: Saturdays - December 16, 23, and 30 and then January 6th. 2: We are going to need help getting the train exhibit down, packed up, and all taken down to the basement after the last day of the exhibit. We will need some young bodies to help us out – especially going up and down the stairs... My body complained every time I did that setting them up. Getting them down the stairs will take many more trips.

Education Department From the Desk of Pat Davidson

The group has been busy working with the youth volunteers. We have an energetic group of students that are very interested in working on projects and learning more. We have been meeting at the museum. We had the students help us for the Fall Festival in October and in November we learned how to warp a lap loom and weave. The students used different layers of yarn and paper strips to complete the project. In December the students helped with the Victorian Christmas for Children at the museum acting as guides to the activities, helping with crafts, pointing out the different features of the train display and refreshments. The youth will be meeting in January and February doing a craft.

We are very fortunate to have such nice students to work with.

Victorian Christmas at the Museum was a great success! We had many more people attend and tour the facility. We had over 50 people attend and take part in the activities for the children. We had a craft, reading time, shopping for the families by the children, train display and refreshments. The children discovered the mice hidden in the museum and had a hunt to find them all. Fun was had by all.

Our first school tour is scheduled for May. We will have a lot of planning to do with all the changes in the mansion. A team will have to help rewrite the script for the inside of the mansion with information about the new furniture pieces. If you are willing to help with school tours let us know. We have sitting jobs and standing jobs. We need a lot of people to do all these tours. We raised over \$2000 dollars donated to SHS last year!

Proposed Changes to Seaford Historical Society By-laws

The full text of the bylaws is available upon request. For the consideration of active members present at the January 15 meetin

ARTICLE V The Governing Board

Section A –The Governing Board shall include an Executive Board and at least nine Trustees. The Executive Board is composed of the President, <u>Executive Vice President</u>, <u>Two Vice Presidents</u>, Secretary, Treasurer, and Past President.

Remainder of Section A, concerning honorary board members, curator, and City of Seaford representative is unchanged.

Section B – The terms of the Executive Officers shall be for one year commencing upon their election at the annual membership meeting in January of each year. A person may not serve as President or Vice-President for more than three consecutive one-year terms. Persons may serve as Secretary, Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer for an unlimited number of consecutive terms. There is no limit to the number of terms served by an Executive Officer.

The remainder of Article V, regarding board meetings and board member duties, is unchanged.

ARTICLE VI Duties Of The Executive Officers

Section B – The <u>Executive</u> Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in his/her absence, and in case of resignation or other contingencies shall become the President for the remainder of that term and serve as President for the next term. The Executive Vice President and the two Vice Presidents will each have oversite responsibility for one of the following facilities: the Governor Ross Mansion, the Seaford Museum, and the Ross Station Event Center.

At the discretion of the President, Vice Presidents shall be appointed to oversee the facilities, including personnel management. The Executive Director shall report to the President.

The Executive Vice President and the Vice Presidents shall be responsible for other duties as assigned by the President, including committees.

The remainder of Article VI, regarding the duties of other officers, is unchanged.
